Of Interest ...Station 8: Hopkinton Aqueduct N 43o 11.570 W 071o 40.940 The Hopkinton Aqueduct Association, formed in 1840, supplied water to Hopkinton Village from hand dug wells and wooden pipes.

War of 1812, the Spanish American War, and the Civil War. Other monuments in the park honor those who have served in World War I, World War II, and wars since. A fountain near the Soldiers Monument commemorates the formation of Hopkinton's Aqueduct Association in 1840, which was spearheaded by Horace Chase. The waters were drawn from springs about a half mile away on the eastern slope of Putney Hill on land owned by Abraham Burnham. (Courtesy of Hopkinton Historical Society.)

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
